

NOTHING IS WASTED IN AA

A LETTER from a friend "back East" has this to say about inventories, that when he began to take inventory he let himself in for "a lot of satisfactory trouble."

"Actually, when we begin a serious inventory, we begin a program of changing ourselves," he writes. "There were difficulties. Some things were easily changed-some facts were hard to face.

"Particularly disturbing to me was the mere recognition of a defect of character. When I became honest enough to admit the defect, and desirous of doing something about it, then I had feelings of guilt that I'd not done something about it much sooner.

"Gradually I learned that to try to do everything at once is to do nothing in the long run. I learned to take care--or try to take care--of the most disturbing things as they occurred to me because, after all, the way I feel within is the only true measure of importance--and I could not attempt to change before I felt a need for it.

"I agree that nothing is wasted in AA if we are sincere, if we are really trying and not substituting a lot of talk about the program for the actual practice of its principles in our daily lives.

"The principles endure forever and are all-inclusive, but we may apply them only a day at a time--and often only to one thing at a time.

"All this I learned as time went on. Naturally, I've not become a perfect man, but the sincere effort to improve and the honest admission of my defects has helped me enormously toward a happier life in spite of my imperfections."

Service Concept Four:

"Throughout our Conference structure, we ought to maintain at all responsible levels, a traditional "Right of Participation," taking care that each classification or group of our world servants shall be allowed a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must dis-charge" To better understand of this Concept, please read the full Concept IV in the A.A. Concept IV: Right of Participation

Have you ever felt that your ideas of how to go about doing your job as an employee or as a volunteer were not appreciated? Or, that other ideas you had about your work situation were ignored? These are exact opposites of the meaning of "right of participation." Concept IV tells us that throughout our A.A. service structure we ought to maintain at all responsible levels a traditional "right of participation," taking care that each classification or group of our trusted servants be allowed a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must carry out.

Bill W. says the lessons learned about this right of participation, as in most A.A. lessons, came the hard way. In the early days A.A. headquarters was run on authoritarian and institutional lines. At that time, A.A's Trustees saw no reason to delegate their managerial powers or to work with voting participation with anyone outside their own body. The result was often grievous trouble and misunderstanding. It was years before we saw that we could never put all authority in one group and virtually all responsibility in another and then expect efficiency of operation, let alone real harmony. Participation can usually stop this sort of demoralizing nonsense before it starts. We are not ordertakers nor rubber-stamps. We are participants and trusted servants.

Paraphrasing Bill further, he says that we are not against the idea of an ultimate authority. We are only against its misapplication and misuse. The "right of participation" is correction of a misuse or harshness in the application of authority.

Bill also discusses how the right of participation is important spiritually to us individually and to A.A. as a whole. This applies to our relationships with each other throughout our fellowship. All of us have a deep desire to belong and to be included. Because of this we prefer an A.A. relationship of "brotherly partnership." Among A.A members, in our groups, and among our local and world service workers there should never be any who are considered "second class". "Right of participation" includes the attitude that all participants in A.A. make valid and important contributions to our work together.

By implication, this relationship of "brotherly partnership" would extend to how we treat each other as persons and how we respect and honor the job each person is doing. A past A.A. Trustee expands on this idea when she says that as we work together in A.A., it is not so much what we do or accomplish, but how well we treat each other while we do it that really matters. "Right of participation" includes having all our ideas both heard and respected.

Cake or no cake

After moving to different towns, a member gets a big lesson in how other meetings like to clap, share, pass the basket and celebrate



I got sober in a large metropolitan area where there were well over 200 meetings per day listed in our Where and When. Meetings varied in attendance and content: some were

open, some closed; some were Step meetings, some Big Book meetings. There were discussion meetings and speaker meetings. Groups might only meet once a week or have multiple meetings every week, even several a day. Variety was there in all its glory and I thought nothing of it.

At around five years of sobriety, I moved to a small rural town where there was only one meeting a day in my county and only seven groups in our entire three-county district. The meetings and the people seemed so different that I found myself reporting to my former bigcity sponsor: "They don't do it right here!" Among my issues were the way folks celebrated sober anniversaries. In my old city, anniversaries were celebrated at the big weekly speaker meetings with cake, cards and medallions. They announced who was celebrating, and where, at least three weeks in advance. Group secretaries used pocket calendars to keep the parties straight. In my new town, no announcements were made. In fact, no anniversaries were celebrated at all. You picked up a chip at whatever meeting you attended on the day of your anniversary. Everyone clapped and that was it—what a letdown.

I learned that there are two major lines of thought on this: Some feel that celebrating an anniversary is an ego trip that should be minimized. Others think it very important to make a big deal out of an anniversary to show the newcomer that the program works. My new home group was somewhere in between.

Eventually, I moved again to a slightly larger community with more and bigger meetings, and more than 30 groups in my district. In my new town, anniversaries were celebrated at special speaker meetings once a month, where cake, cards and medallions are offered. I felt like I was "home" again, even though it was not exactly how it was done back in the big city, where they did it right. Imagine my surprise—and attitude adjustment—when a woman moved to my new town from the same place I had gotten sober and complained that we "didn't do it right here." Her big issue was "half-time." In our old area, the meeting leaders often read the announcements and passed the basket halfway through the meeting, while my new groups would make the announcements and pass the basket at the beginning of the meeting. I have attended meetings from Oregon to Florida to New York to San Francisco, as well as meetings in several foreign countries. In one meeting I visited, they announced that cross-talk was not permitted and if you had something to say to someone else, you wrote them a note. Note cards were then presented to the attendees. In another meeting, a speaker talked for a half hour and then everyone took a smoke break, coming back to finish the meeting with open discussion. In one large city, a meeting starts off with the readings and someone offers a topic, then the group counts off by ones and twos to split up and discuss the topic in smaller groups. The bottom line is this: The details of the format are not important, no more than the details of the individual alcoholic. I may be old or young, wear glasses or a beard, be male or female. None of that changes the fact that I am alcoholic. Whether a meeting offers note cards or passes the basket at the midpoint of the meeting doesn't take away from the message of sobriety offered by the folks who are present in the meeting. The Fourth Tradition permits the individuality

The Fourth Tradition permits the individuality of each group to reflect their own personality, which then allows each of us to retain our own individuality while we pursue our common goal—to stay sober and help another alcoholic get sober. Today I find that comforting.




