In all its proceedings, the Intergroup Association observes the spirit of AA Traditions, taking great care that the Intergroup Association never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus a reserve be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Intergroup Association members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decision be reached by discussion, vote and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that no Intergroup Association action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Intergroup Association may act for the service of AA Groups in the Northern Nevada area and parts of Northern California, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Intergroup Association itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.

WHAT ARE A.A.'S TWELVE CONCEPTS?

In addition to the question of what are the concepts, we might also ask why we have them. Neither of these questions is easy to answer in just a few words, but here's a try.

In the late 1940s Bill Wilson along with others of AA's founding members and supporters began to see that AA was going to grow rapidly, even worldwide, and that some structure was needed to allow for this growth. The Fellowship would need to deal with its relationships with the world around it, its finances, its day-to-day administrative operations, and its publication and policy decisions--all among a number of other matters that would inevitably develop. Based on these needs, a complex but now-proven highly successful service structure was developed for our Fellowship. There are at least two basic principles on which this service structure was founded: that the ownership of AA would be its members and groups; and that its structure would always be democratic in thought, spirit and action.

Two entities were created, chartered and incorporated in the mid-1950s as not-for-profit organizations under the legal structure of the State of New York. These are known as Alcoholics Anonymous World Services, Inc., (AAWS) and the AA Grapevine, Inc. Each of these has its own board of directors. Additionally, some way to relate AA to the outside world and to coordinate AA policy and services was needed. For this purpose, AA's General Service Board (GSB) was created. Members of the GSB are referred to as Trustees, and include both alcoholic members and non-alcoholic AA supporters selected primarily for professional expertise they offer. Also needed was a way to deal with day-to-day operations. The AA General Service Office (GSO) with a paid staff was set up to do this. And finally, some method was needed to carry out the practical matters of AA ownership and democratic participation among its groups and members. To do this, the General Service Conference was set up, along with its participating structure of group representatives (GSRs), Districts with District Committees (DCMs), Areas and Area Officers, and Delegates elected from among these to represent them at an annual Conference meeting held in the Spring of each year. Communication and participation in decision making are primary functions of this Conference structure.

Early AA members also foresaw the need for services at the local level and, thus, intergroups and central offices were created to provide these services.

Bill saw each of these as working in service rather than as governing bodies. All would work together in the spirit of cooperation and service to the Fellowship as a whole as well as to AA groups and members.

Overall, this is a rather complex service structure, and Bill saw a need to provide further elaboration of the underlying principles and the foundation for how these entities would work together. The Twelve Concepts provide this. They were written in the early 1960s by Bill with the help of Bernard Smith, a Trustee at the time and Michael Alexander who later also became a Trustee. They were first published in 1962 as AA's Twelve Concepts for World Service.

CONCEPT ONE

I knew early on that there was something more to AA than my home group, and saw that I wanted to be a part of that. I was fortunate to meet a special AA member who introduced me to the study of the Twelve Traditions which further broadened my view of AA. He became my Service Sponsor, and we sat down together to also study AA's Twelve Concepts. I had been aware of the Concepts, but I had no idea about what they were or why we had them.

Concept One introduces AA World Services, something I didn't even know existed. I suspected that the important AA business was taken care of by the big shots like Bill and Dr. Bob as well as the professional folks in the office in New York who sent us orders telling our group what to do and how to do it.

My thinking was not completely wrong. For the first several years, responsibility and authority for all of AA did rest on the shoulders of our founders. By 1950, however, it became apparent that services such as producing uniform literature, developing public information resources, publishing books, and answering calls for help could no longer be handled by the founders alone. A serious decline in Dr. Bob's health was a major factor leading to this realization. Also, AA had expanded geographically and grown in membership by large numbers.

Many early members felt that AA's future was guaranteed under the protection of God. But, after much discussion, there came a realization that a practical operational structure was needed to assure AA's future. Their first step was to create a group of AAs and non-alcoholic professionals who would take on responsibility for an orderly growth. This group, known early as the trusteeship, has become the AA General Service Board.

Bill also saw that only a representative conference would be appropriate as a replacement for himself and Dr. Bob. The way to protect AA's future was to be found in the "collective conscience" of the Fellowship as a whole. Bill acknowledges that it is difficult to imagine how such a collective responsibility might be achieved among such widely scattered AA groups. His solution is in what we now know as the AA General Service Conference. Delegates to this Conference represent geographic Areas of the U.S. and Canada, elected by the individual groups through their elected General Service Representatives, District Committee members and other trusted servants.

The Conference operates in service to groups and members rather than as a governing body. Concept One draws heavily on Tradition Two for its spiritual foundation, reminding us that God is our ultimate authority and that AA leaders serve rather than govern. In this way, Concept One along with Tradition Two provides the spiritual foundation for all of our Fellowship. Bill has described AA as a spiritualized society characterized by enough enlightenment, enough responsibility, and enough love to ensure that it will work under all conditions. Concepts Two through Twelve follow to develop more detail about how our AA service structure works.





Who Does This Jerk Think I Am?

A newcomer gives us an

amusing look into her alcoholic mind as she encounters AA for the first time.



(7:00 am) The day started out like any other day with Led Zeppelin blaring in my ears. The loud music set off a staccato of the hangover blues in my brain. It was time to get up and face the day. I flopped over the edge of the bed and grabbed my clothes. I threw them on, stumbling down the dark, narrow hallway to my son's door. I saw the sun shining through the sheer curtains on his cherubic face. A little devil inside of me wanted to wake him up rudely but I stomped the thought down and woke him up gently.

"Come on, David. It is time to wake up."

(7:10 am) David, his face scrubbed and dressed for school, and I had breakfast together. David had his usual bowl of cereal and I had my usual tall glass of ice water with heavy-duty pain killers.

(7:30 am) "Hurry David, or you will miss the bus." (7:35 am) The house was peaceful even if my thoughts were not. Now it was time to make like the good little housewife and clean.

(9:30 am) Everything was all clean. I decided to just sit on the couch, looking at all the neat lines the vacuum had left behind. So I sat and vegetated with ugly thoughts whirling around in my head.

(Is life really worth living? Now where did that come from? I will not deal with that right now! Go away! No! What are you contributing to life, Lorraine? A clean house? Whoopee! Stop this now! Call a friend. What friend, dummy? You don't have any friends. I need a drink.) The shrill ringing of the phone shut off my unwanted thoughts.

"Hello?" (What the hell do you want?)

"Hi. This is your brother, what's up?"

"Nothing much, just sitting here relaxing." (Thinking of suicide, but I am fine, thanks!)

"What are you doing tonight?"

"Nothing" (Just going to take a whole bottle of pain pills.)
"Why don't you come to an AA meeting with me tonight?
"Mike you know that Rick is the alcoholic in this family,
not me. I need Al-Anon, not Alcoholics Anonymous." (Who
does this jerk think I am, anyway?)

"Just come and see what the meetings are like, okay? I'll buy you steak dinner afterwards."

"Okay." (I never could pass up a free meal. Besides, steak sounded better to me than a bottle full of pills.)

"All right. I'll pick you up at seven o'clock. Bye." (Hmmm, he sure sounded happy.)

(12:15 pm) David was all smiles as he hopped off the bus. What was it with this kid anyway? Beautiful day my butt! The sky was clouding up and it looked like rain.

"Let's get home and take a nap before it starts to rain, David."

(2:30 pm) "Sure you can go in the backyard and play, David. No, Mommy doesn't want to play with you. Mommy is going to read a book."

(4:30 pm) "Oh, hi Rick."

"Hi. Where is David?"

"He's out back playing." (Nice to see you too, idiot.) "I'm going out with my brother tonight. What do you want for dinner?"

"Hamburgers sound okay to me."

"David and you can go to get fast food then." (Gee, Hon, the house looks nice. Where are you going tonight? Do you even care, Rick?)

(5:30 pm) (The stupid idiot wasn't even home for an hour and the place was a mess. The towels were all over the bathroom floor, whiskers in the sink, dirty clothes everywhere and he left the toilet seat up again! Who did he think I was, his maid? A swift kick put the clothes into a corner.)

(7:00 pm) (The harsh buzzing of the doorbell sounded throughout the house. Mikey had arrived. He still looked like death warmed over from his drug abuse. I still wanted to know what that stupid idiot had to smile about.) "See ya later, Rick. Bye, bye, David." As we drove through the gathering dusk I asked Mike, "What's an A.A. meeting like anyways?" "Wait and see." (That is all he would say.)

(7:15 pm) We had arrived at the meeting. (Hey Mike, wait up. Your sister is scared spitless!)

(7:30 pm) (Who are all these smiling people? They sure don't look like alcoholics or addicts. Opening prayer? I get it now, this is a religious group. Twelve Steps? Not affiliated with any sect or denomination- I'm confused? Will newcomers stand and identify? What's a newcomer? Someone with 30 days or less of sobriety? Not me! I'm not one of them!)

My whirling chaotic thoughts were interrupted as people around me began to stand up and introduce themselves. Suddenly I heard a voice inside my head,

("STAND UP!") I shot up off the couch as if I had been fired out of a gun. "My name is Lorraine and I am an alcoholic." Once I had said that and sat back down, I had felt an overwhelming sense of relief. I wouldn't have to carry my burdens alone anymore. Those people were there to help me in any way they could.

The next day everything seemed different.

(7:00 am) The Doors were merrily playing on the radio as I opened my eyes. I hopped out of bed and got dressed quickly. Breathlessly I hurried down to my son's room. I couldn't wait to see my son's sleeping face. "Hey sleepyhead, open your eyes. Come on David, it's a brand new day. Look it is raining! Maybe you and I can play in the puddles when you get home from school. Come on David, It's a beautiful day."

A GROUP CALLED MONA

Without AA unity, my common self would be dead! It is my uncommon self that has survived. The common thing for an alcoholic to do is get drunk. Only an uncommonly small percentage of us get sober and stay that way. Thanks to our common welfare coming first, I celebrated twenty-seven years of frequent happy, joyous, and free behavior last Halloween.

My personal recovery depends upon AA unity all the way from the people living in my home, through my Attitude Adjustment AA Group, the General Service Office, and the annual General Service Conference. With that many people in unity for me, my personal recovery ought to be a cinch. So far, so good.

For me to be a part of that unified group, I must take responsibility for my personal recovery. I must live by spiritual principles. And to keep the priceless gift of that recovery, I have to give it away in Twelfth Step work and as an active member of my home group. My sponsor, however--that ever-present listener who hands accountability back to me, at times in big, emotionally heavy chunks--has helped me realize that there another group for me to consider. In short, there's more than one me stumbling around in my head.

I'm a whole committee, and my personal welfare and, ultimately, that of my home group, depends upon the unity of that inner head-group. Inside me, I'm a wife, a mother, a grandmother, a business woman, a homemaker, and a lover. I'm also a seventy-year-old teenager, a self-appointed authority figure, a cynic, a seeker, a musician, and a preacher. And I have an inner coward and an inner fighter in there as well. It's a motley group and it's all mine to manage. At times I can raise my hand as an example of how well it all works; at other times I'm bloody and a bit bowed.

My husband knows me well enough to ignore some of the members of my internal committee. He says that usually he doesn't want me to verbalize my observations on his nutrition, health, and hygiene, thank-you-very-much. But, you see, when I get to observing, I have trouble stopping. My inner authority figure wants to ignore his objections and hand the problem off to the inner wife, lover, and homemaker for prompt resolution. But ultimately, my head group comes up with the right solution: I close my mouth and breathe through my nose. We have no opinions on outside issues.

I like some of the members of my head-group, but I would like to bump a few of the others unceremoniously out of my crowded cranium. The business woman has served me well through the years, the grandmother gets positive feedback from a few pre-adolescent admirers, and I've learned to be a mother to adult daughters (after offering them a lot of domestic rubble in my drinking days). For that improvement I thank my Higher Power and AA unity.

I have come to believe that all members of my head-group are there to work together for my personal welfare. Sometimes the mother in me needs a quick sermonette; the business woman and homemaker can benefit from the confidence displayed by my inner authority figure.

And so it is with my home group. My AA group needs all of its members. Although some seem to have been handed off to the rest of us as a test of serenity, the unity--as well as the uniqueness--of our AA group is the result of the shared experience, strength, and hope of each of us as individuals. In the process, I can learn about both the common and the uncommon side of myself and of others in my group, as we pursue our personal recovery by working for the common good.
