In all its proceedings, the Intergroup Association observes the spirit of AA Traditions, taking great care that the Intergroup Association never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus a reserve be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Intergroup Association members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decision be reached by discussion, vote and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that no Intergroup Association action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Intergroup Association may act for the service of AA Groups in the Northern Nevada area and parts of Northern California, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Intergroup Association itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.

Entirely Ready

IN JANUARY of this year, through God's grace and the miracle of AA, I had achieved approximately fourteen months of continuous sobriety. I had just taken a Fifth Step.

After about a week of sharing with AA friends about my Fifth Step, I began to look at Step Six. I had no idea what to do for a while. It didn't take long for some ill effects to settle in. My arrogance and my inflated ego returned. I was very fearful and quite confused. Why had everything looked so wonderful such a short time earlier? Why was the future looking so bleak? Why couldn't I stay in the now? This went on for about two months. Needless to say, I was an emotional wreck and a spiritual scoffer.


One night, unable to sleep, I began to talk to God for the first time in weeks. I cannot recall all of what I said, but my words came out something like this: "I don't want to be this scared little boy anymore. I don't want to have so much foolish pride. I want to be more honest. I want to be more capable of loving myself and others." After about twenty minutes, I closed by telling God that I *was* scared, that I knew He loved me, and that I didn't know where to turn. Unbelievable as it seems, it wasn't more than ten minutes later that serenity replaced the self-pity in my bones. Peace of mind pushed the fears right out of my mind. Then, I realized what had occurred. Unconsciously, I had just worked Steps Six and Seven.

I can see now, in looking back on this experience, that the three months of pain were absolutely necessary. Without that bit of hurt and confusion, I do not think I could possibly have been "entirely ready" for God to remove my character defects. At a time when I could not help myself and would not ask for assistance from another human being, God--as I understand Him--led me through what has probably been the most trying time of my life. I can think back to the promises in the Big Book now and say, "God really does do for me what I cannot do for myself."

The old defects occasionally crop up again; but now, I seem to have the sense to talk to my sponsors or other AA friends when I'm scared, lonely, and/or confused. Again, the Big Book promises on page 84, "We will intuitively know how to handle situations which used to baffle us."

Well, this is just one of several miraculous experiences in my life since joining AA, all of which have had much influence in making me what I am today-a very grateful alcoholic.

Concept VI – A.A. Functions Democratically in Principle While Also Following a Corporate Model in Its Business Operations.

The first five Concepts provide the foundation for Alcoholics Anonymous to operate democratically as a fellowship. Then, in Concept VI, Bill adds discussion of how A.A. at the level of its world services is also a very large business. He introduces the "corporate model" as the basis for A.A. business operations.

A.A. is both a fellowship and a corporation? How complicated is that? It's beginning to sound like Bill had never heard of KISS. I now also needed to figure out why A.A. has and needs two operational sides, working closely together--both the General Service Conference and the General Service Board. Then I was told to read on through Concepts 6, 7, and 8 to really understand.

Bill elaborates on what he means by the "corporate model", saying that "Our Trustees must function almost exactly like the directors of any large business corporation. They must have ample authority to effectively manage and conduct A.A.'s business." Aha! I am beginning to understand. A simple way to think of this is that the A.A. General Service Conference is critical to our working harmoniously together as a fellowship, while the General Service Board, the Trustees, assures that we follow sound business practices, although these purposes do overlap.

Bill says that our Trustees need to be given a wide latitude of judgment and action. They need this because we A.A.'s are holding them mainly responsible for all our service activities. The Trustees have the legal and practical responsibility for the operation of A.A. World Services, Inc. which embraces A.A. publishing as well as the General Service Office, and of the A.A. Grapevine, Inc. These entities have a combined cash flow of many millions of dollars annually. The Trustees are also responsible for A.A.'s public information activities. They are the guardians of the Twelve Traditions. They are responsible for carrying the A.A. message to countries around the world. They are A.A.'s "bankers", overseeing the financial operations and investing A.A.'s substantial Reserve Fund. They are busy people who hold a great deal of responsibility for the effectiveness of A.A. workings.

Who are these Trustees to whom we give such authority? They fall into two categories: Class A and Class B. Class A Trustees are persons who are not and have not been afflicted by the disease of alcoholism and who express a profound faith in the recovery program upon which A.A. was founded. They are persons who have been friends of A.A., including members of professions such as medicine, law, the clergy, finance, or any other field that may have occasion to work with alcoholics, and whose personal and/or professional expertise and dedication can be invaluable to our Fellowship. Class B Trustees are sober A.A. members who have been nominated through our General Service committees and usually are members who have been deeply involved in A.A. service.

All Trustee nominations, Class A and Class B, are approved by the General Service Conference. Trustees serve a limited term. All serve as volunteers with no monetary payment. Each serves out of a 'labor of love' for Alcoholics Anonymous.

I have learned through the study of Concept VI that the General Service Board Trustees give us assurance that our business matters, particularly, are well taken care of. I am confident that the Trustees will perform their tasks effectively, guard our Traditions well, and serve our A.A. Society throughout the world. This ultimately frees me to devote my attention to carrying out our Fellowship's primary purpose found in Tradition Five--to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.



Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.

I HAVE attacked Step Six many times. It has attacked me in return. We have had open warfare, and we have had moratoriums. For periods of time, I have purposely ignored this Step. Often, I have stated that it did not make sense to me.

The battle began some years back, when I regularly attended Step-discussion meetings. I had done my best on the first five Steps, I thought. I had even made a written list of all my defects. They counted up to twenty-seven. Following the example of an old-timer friend of mine, whose quality of sobriety I admired, I printed, in ink, each one of my separate defects on a white poker chip. Then all twenty-seven chips went into a small, fat, yellow pitcher. Every morning on awaking, I plunged my hand into it (like picking a number from a goldfish bowl) and came up with the "chip for today." The defect might be anger, fear, pride, resentment, gossip, snobbery, self-pity, and so on, but whichever one it was had to be concentrated upon for the next 24 hours, and either reduced to a minimum or cast away.

It was a kind of game. I enjoyed wrestling with one "defect" a day. I felt I was making progress, really working the AA program. It hadn't yet occurred to me that I had gone overboard on this "defect" business. Twenty-seven indeed! How is that for the "pride" defect? Of course, most of them were not serious flaws of character, such as the inability to be honest with oneself. Most were bad habits possessed, in some degree, by most humans.

Nevertheless, I kept up this game for two or three years, telling many AA friends about it and urging them to go and do likewise. I explained that, although the Step suggested that God would remove these defects when and if I became ready to let go of them, I was of the school that believed in the saying "Pray for potatoes, but reach for the hoe." I did ask my Higher Power to lend a hand on the day's defect I happened to confront, but I felt that He expected me to use energy on rooting it out of my character.

Still, these dozens of defects I had laid claim to kept cropping up again and again, over and over. It seemed that the harder I fought them, the harder they fought back. I became quite discouraged. I decided I had been willing, I had tried, and I would now let Number Six, and myself, have a vacation. I put the little yellow pitcher on a shelf behind some books and only now and then dipped into it. I kept busy and active in AA; I felt comfortable being sober; I was trying to practice the AA principles in all my affairs. Then, out of nowhere, came a deep resentment toward an AA friend. I agonized over it, prayed over it, but discussed it with no one. I had insomnia, indigestion, and fatigue. (Any good doctor can tell you that negative emotions make people physically ill.)

Fortunately, just about that time our group was slated for discussion of Step Six. I opened my copy of *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions* and read the Step all the way through. Although I had read it many times before, it seemed as if I saw its meaning for the first time. I gathered that, instead of fighting mightily against a defect, I had to let go of it. Just simply open up my hands, my heart, and my mind and say to my Higher Power. "Here it is, this defect. I give it to you. Please remove it from me." In this case, it was the bitter and destructive resentment that I wished to be rid of. And so it happened. It faded away and never returned.

Since then, I have followed the same procedure on other serious emotional problems, with the same result. I just have to keep in mind that if I am not 100 percent sincere in my willingness to be rid of the problem, the procedure won't work. I have come to realize that Step Six means exactly what it says. No more, no less. When, and if, I become ready to have painful, inhibiting, or long-standing flaws removed, they will be. Not always permanently, not all of them. But if and when they return, they will be weaker and much easier to let go of. As for all those bad habits I once listed as detects. I am trying to arrest them a day at a time, as I do my alcoholism. A little progress has been made on pride. I can now admit that most of my troubles stem from one large and glaring defect: self-centeredness. For how can I wallow in self-pity, weep over resentments, be sick with righteous anger, ache with envy, tense up with fears and anxieties unless all my thoughts are exclusively on poor me?

A long time ago, a very wise man, Marcus Aurelius, wrote: "A man's life is what his thoughts make it." Through Step Six, I have learned how true this is. I may never comprehend it fully, yet I know its value to me. It calls forth the most precious asset any recovering alcoholic can have: the willingness to get out of the driver's seat, to stop trying to run the show. I need to keep the Sixth Step message of letting go and letting God in my own thoughts at all times. -- F. C., Manhattan, New York *Copyright © The AA Grapevine, Inc. (September, 1970).*

Tradition Six

An AA group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the AA name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property, and prestige divert us from our primary purpose. (from the May 1948 Grapevine)

The sixth of our Twelve Points of AA Tradition is deemed so important that it states at length the relation of the AA movement to money and property.

This Tradition declares in substance that the accumulation of money, property, and the unwanted personal authority so often generated by material wealth comprise a cluster of serious hazards against which an AA group must ever be on guard. Tradition Six also enjoins the group never to go into business nor ever to lend the AA name or money credit to any "outside" enterprise, no matter how good. Strongly expressed is the opinion that even clubs should not bear the AA name; that they ought to be separately incorporated and managed by those individual AAs who need or want clubs enough to financially support them.

We would thus divide the spiritual from the material, confine the AA movement to its sole aim, and ensure (however wealthy as individuals we may become) that AA itself shall always remain poor. We dare not risk the distractions of corporate wealth. Years of experience have proven these principles beyond doubt. They have become certainties, absolute verities for us. Thank God, we AAs have never yet been caught in the kind of religious or political disputes which embroil the world of today. But we ought to face the fact that we have often quarreled violently about money, property, and the administration thereof. Money, in quantity, has always been a baleful influence in group life. Let a well-meaning donor present an AA group with a sizable sum and we break loose. Nor does trouble abate until that group, as such, somehow disposes of its bankroll. This experience is practically universal. "But," say our friends, "isn't this a confession of weakness? Other organizations do a lot of good with money. Why not AA?"

Of course, we of AA would be the first to say that many a fine enterprise does a lot of good with a lot of money. To these efforts, money is usually primary; it is their lifeblood. But money is *not* the lifeblood of AA. With us, it is very secondary. Even in small quantities, it is scarcely more than a necessary nuisance, something we wish we could do without entirely. Why is that so?

We explain this easily enough; we don't need money. The core of our AA procedure is one alcoholic talking to another, whether that be sitting on a curbstone, in a home, or at a meeting. It's the message, not the place; it's the talk, not the alms. That does our work. Just places to meet and talk, that's about all AA needs. Beyond these, a few small offices, a few secretaries at their desks, a few dollars apiece a year, easily met by voluntary contributions. Trivial indeed, *our* expenses! Nowadays, the AA group answers its well-wishers saying: "Our expenses are trifling. As good earners, we can easily pay them. As we neither need nor want money, why risk its hazards? We'd rather stay poor. Thanks just the same!" Bill W.

CPC/PI - Here are the ongoing activities that CPC and PI have been involved with for the past month: University of Nevada Medical School, Reno: Joyce Y. (NNIG PI chair) and Cheryl E. (NNIG CPC chair), along with other CPC committee members meet with Dr. DeKay and Dr. Chen and 4-5 third year medical students on a scheduled, rotating basis. We provide the students with some appropriate pamphlets and central office meeting schedules and a short presentation on CPC. The students get an assignment to attend a 12 step meeting and then they report back on their experience in about 6 weeks. We also attend the report backs. A new student rotation began on May 19th. The report backs will be June 13th at 2pm. We could use a few more folks to attend these meetings. They usually take place at 2pm on a M,T, or F. Let Cheryl know if you are interested. Washoe County School District (WCSD), Reno: We are working with counselors at the WCSD to create a presentation on alcoholism and AA geared for high school students during a health class. Tom B, Skip, Joyce, and Cheryl have been reworking the presentation to put it into a Power Point format, as suggested by the school district. We will meet again on June 8^{th} to review it. We expect to begin the presentations in the school in the fall. We will need AA members to volunteer to give this presentation. The presentations will be during the day. Presenters will need to be fingerprinted by school district, and "trained" to facilitate to provide consistency and adherence to CPC/PI guidelines. Please contact Joyce or Cheryl if you have an interest in presenting at the schools. Orientation to AA Presentations: The purpose of these presentations is to help folks new to AA and court ordered folks to understand AA meetings and the language of AA and how and why we do what we do. These are NOT AA meetings. They are a service to help folks learn about AA. Presentations are currently held at Bristlecone Treatment Center every Thursday at 7pm. The presentations are going well and are very well received. The committee is reworking the presentation to reduce it from 6 presentations to 4. We feel this can be done without removing content topics. This will help each client hear all presentations during their treatment stay. The committee is also working with Behavioral Health Services in Carson City to see about providing the presentations there. Have a contact for the VA also. With all these facilities wanting to have the Orientation to AA presentations, the committee is also looking at how best to be organized to meet this service. We need volunteers to make these presentations, we go in pairs. Please contact Joyce or Cheryl if you are interested. Reno Valley Assisted Living Monthly AA Meeting: The Seniors In Sobriety group facilitates a monthly meeting the 3rd Tuesday of each month at 6pm. About 5 residents have been attending. They really appreciate having an AA meeting to come to. The next meeting will be June 20th. Renown Hospital: Paul (Sunshine Committee Chair), Pat (BTG Chair), Joyce and Cheryl met on May 10th to discuss the service opportunity with Renown Hospital. We reviewed the meetings we had had with Renown and discussed what we might be able to do to meet their needs. We came up with some suggestions and agreed we needed to meet with them again. Joyce contacted the lead Chaplain at Renown. They are currently going through some reorganization and will get back with us when they are ready to move forward again. Public Service Announcements: We currently have public service announcements for radio and TV. We need a volunteer or volunteers who will contact radio and television stations to see if they will air these. Please contact Cheryl or Joyce if interested in helping with these. Project HELP Nevada: Got a request from Central Office to contact Project HELP Nevada. They are a resource center providing support services to men, women, and youth suffering from alcoholism and/or addiction. They will be holding a Women of Worth course and wanted 10 Big Books for the participants. They work with Life Changes, sober living homes in Reno.
