In all its proceedings, the Intergroup Association observes the spirit of AA Traditions, taking great care that the Intergroup Association never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus a reserve be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Intergroup Association members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decision be reached by discussion, vote and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that no Intergroup Association action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Intergroup Association may act for the service of AA Groups in the Northern Nevada area and parts of Northern California, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Intergroup Association itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.



# Always Worse, Never Better The Power of Example

I walked into the meeting room that Friday night convinced it wasn't going to work for me anymore. I decided I'd sit through the meeting, then go out and get drunk. I had it planned: where I'd drink, what I'd drink, and who I'd drink with.

It was a newcomers meeting at one of our clubhouses here in Las Vegas. I was not yet ninety days sober, one of a large crop of newcomers in the fall of 1995. I'd been coming to this newcomers meeting every Friday and Saturday night for nearly twelve weeks.

I knew many of the people in the room that night. For weeks, I had been following my sponsor's direction to shake hands with at least five of my fellow alcoholics at every meeting. I'd shaken hands with those with more time than I had and with those who were in their first few days.

I had discovered in those early months that I was surrounded by people just like me. We all were learning how to stay away from a drink and to use the tools of the program. Looking around the room on any given Friday night, I'd spot another newcomer and know the days, weeks, and months they had in the program. Sometimes I felt that I knew down to the minute how much sober time each one had. I'm sure many of them knew down to the minute how much time I had.

It was later that I learned that just a few minutes in Alcoholics Anonymous could make a big difference in your own recovery.

After I put thirty days together, my sponsor suggested that I pay attention to new guys coming in the door. I didn't believe I had anything to give. But someone just a few days away from a drink, he said, may find the faith to keep coming back after talking to someone with thirty days or sixty days. "Try and make them feel welcome," he explained. "They're scared, lonely and confused, just like you."

I knew it was true for me. When I didn't have three days in the program, I saw a guy named Nick take a thirty-day chip. I knew Nick had what I wanted, thirty days without drinking, and I believed that I might be able to stay around that long. Nick was about my age and, I learned from later conversations, had a troubled marriage like my own. The prospect of going a whole month without getting drunk was suddenly attainable.

When the meeting was about to start, I grabbed a cup of coffee and made my way to my seat. Nick was sitting at a table talking with some other AAs. I shook his hand as I passed by; Nick seemed to be as distracted as I felt.

I still wanted what Nick had but I wasn't convinced Alcoholics Anonymous would continue working for me. I was surrounded by people in that meeting room but feeling isolated and alone, planning my next drunk while I waited for the meeting to start.

When the chairman called for anyone with less than two weeks of sobriety to share how they stayed sober that day, Nick started talking. I was stunned. Nick? Drinking again? But he had taken a drink and somehow made it back to AA. He shared about saying his prayers, calling his sponsor, reading the Big Book, and staying out of bars that day, but I barely heard him. My mind tried to digest this revelation. Nick had gone back out? Didn't he have the AA program down pat?

I was still wondering about what had happened to Nick as we gathered in the circle, holding hands, and saying the Lord's Prayer. The thoughts of getting drunk were pushed away. I knew fear and remorse would be heavy on Nick's heart. I followed my sponsor's direction--go to the new guy and make him feel welcome. Shaking Nick's hand, I asked him if he wanted to have a cup of coffee at one of the picnic tables in the backyard.

We sat down and the story of his spree started pouring out. I recognized the shame and fear. There were a lot of tears. Seeing another's pain that close, that personally, was a new experience for me.

His wife was gone, his children were gone, the house was gone, the car was wrecked, and the job was gone. It had taken only a few short days. Alcoholics Anonymous was the only place left, he said. That phrase from the Big Book, "always worse, never better," kept running through my mind as Nick talked to me across the picnic table. I became convinced that AA had to work for me.

After nearly an hour, it was time for Nick to go. Strong emotions can wear you out. I felt exhausted, too exhausted to go anywhere but to another meeting and then home to bed.

When I read Bill's story and come across the line "when all other measures fail, work with another alcoholic would save the day," I think about the evening I spent with Nick and how that kept me sober one more day.

And whenever I hear someone say, "Don't leave five minutes before the miracle happens," I know how that AA saying applies to me. A few minutes made a big difference in my recovery.

# Meetings, dances and late night coffee

A General Service trustee remembers how much Young Peoples'
Conferences helped him get sober



I first came to AA as a teenager and got sober in my early 20s. I had the great privilege to serve as an area delegate, and I am currently a Class B General Service trustee. I also had the opportunity to serve on an International Conference of Young People in AA (ICYPAA) host committee and its advisory council. While I have heard some say that ICYPAA and other young peoples' AA conferences separate young people from the rest of AA, I believe it had the exact opposite effect on my AA path. Without learning about service at ICYPAA, and being encouraged by those I met through ICYPAA, I would have never become a GSR. At the end of the day, regardless of any past or current title I may have held or hold, the most important one will always be my role as a GSR.

If I could ever go back in time, I would have loved to be present at the International Convention in 1955 when AA came of age ... and maybe have just a 30-minute cup of coffee with Bill W. I would also love to have attended the first ICYPAA in 1958. ICYPAA was not started to separate young members from the rest of AA. Two men, a probation officer in Canada and an electrician in Philadelphia, who both got sober young, decided that since AA is a program of "experience" they needed a place where young people could benefit from the experience of others.

While the Twelve Steps are the same for all alcoholics, we are all taught that we share only experience and not opinions. So back in the late 1950s, young alcoholics needed real-life experience with life events, like going to a high school dance sober, going to college sober, dealing with disappointed parents, and the list goes on and on. A man or woman who got sober at an older age would only have opinions on how to go to high school proms or college sober. So while thousands of young members have benefited from sponsors who got sober much older, we often depend on our peers to assist with many tricky real-life situations.

Recently I was given the opportunity of a lifetime to attend the fifth European Conference of Young People in AA

(EURYPAA) in the city of Prague in the Czech Republic. What a gift. It was a real learning and growing experience for me. A past Czech General Service board member met me on my first day and took me for coffee and to a local meeting. While conferences, conventions, and, dare I say, even service events are near and dear to my AA heart. there is nothing guite like a real local AA meeting where people who suffer from the same disease as I do gather for the purpose of our Fifth Tradition. As I sat there I realized that AA was more than 30 years old when I was born, yet in the Czech Republic, AA did not exist when I went to my first meeting. If I had lived there when I went to my first meeting there would have been no local AA group to go to. I also realized what a significant part our literature plays in the building of an AA Fellowship in a place it has never been before. Members there told me how proud they were to recently print Daily Reflections in Czech and how vital the Big Book has been in their recovery. I have to remember every time a Seventh Tradition basket comes around that I am not only paying for my meeting's rent and coffee, but I'm also paying for translating the Big Book into languages for countries who do not yet have it.

So what did I find at that EURYPAA? For the young peoples' AA detractors, I admit I found loud music, chanting and dances, but I found so much more, and that is what I want to write about. I found AA meetings based on our literature, and in particular, meetings based on the program laid out in our basic text, the Big Book. I heard young speakers passionate about carrying the message to other alcoholics of all ages. I found AA members who were involved in service on all levels in the countries, cities and towns they come from. I found out that some of these members face others in AA saying they are trying to be separate, when in fact, all I witnessed was people being encouraged to become Three Legacy members of AA when they return home.

Most important for me, I met young members who come from places where there are few young people in meetings. And like ICYPAA, EURYPAA gave them a once-a-year opportunity to meet other young sober people and learn from their experiences. I had an opportunity to take part in late-night coffee and hear stories of real-life miracles in our great Fellowship.

I will forever treasure attending the fifth EURYPAA and count it as one of those mountaintop experiences I have had in Alcoholics Anonymous. I feel it fitting to close with my favorite Bernard Smith (former chairperson of the General Service Board) quote:

"You have found something great and awesome going for you. Treat it tenderly, respect what it has done for you and what it can do for others ... As long as one man dwells in the darkness you once knew, you cannot rest; you must try to find him and help him become one of you ... by the grace of God, may Alcoholics Anonymous last for all time."

Bridging the Gap – Pat B. Bridging The Gap is an A.A. Service that helps treatment clients make the transition to A.A. once they leave treatment by providing an A.A. Temporary Contact who can take the newcomer to their first A.A. meeting after leaving treatment. One goal of our Service is to help the newcomer begin the process of feeling "comfortable" in A.A. Our committee has a need for Temporary Contact volunteers particularly in cities outside of the greater Reno, Sparks, Carson City areas. Suggested sobriety is one year. If you are interested, please contact me. The NNIG Bridging The Gap Committee is currently making monthly or bi-monthly presentations to the clients at Bristlecone, (rotating Thursdays at 7PM), West Hills, (first Thursday at 2PM), Renown Behavioral Health Services in Reno, (rotating Thursdays at 5:30PM), CrossRoads men's facility, (fourth Thursday at 9AM), CrossRoads women's facility, (fourth Wednesday at 5PM), and Carson Behavioral Health Services, (Tuesdays at 7PM). Our committee members travel in pairs to deliver presentations to clients that explain the Bridging The Gap message, show the A.A. DVD "Hope", and collect BTG Temporary Contact Requests from clients. We also answer any questions clients may have about A.A. and try to correct any misconceptions that may exist regarding our Fellowship.

The Committee has a need for both men and women Fellowship members who can make themselves available to make BTG presentations at Treatment Facilities, usually once per month. Some of our presentations are delivered to co-ed facilities and a team of men and women is desirable for these facilities. The presentations are one hour and are sometimes delivered during business hours. Complete training is provided. Continuous sobriety of two years and working knowledge of our Traditions are suggested requirements for Program Presenters.
