In all its proceedings, the Intergroup Association observes the spirit of AA Traditions, taking great care that the Intergroup Association never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus a reserve be its prudent financial principal; that none of the Intergroup Association members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decision be reached by discussion, vote and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that no Intergroup Association action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Intergroup Association may act for the service of AA Groups in the Northern Nevada area and parts of Northern California, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Intergroup Association itself will always remain democratic in thought and action

WHAT ARE A.A.'S TWELVE CONCEPTS?

In addition to the question of what are the concepts, we might also ask why we have them. Neither of these questions is easy to answer in just a few words, but here's a try. In the late 1940s Bill Wilson along with others of AA's founding members and supporters began to see that AA was going to grow rapidly, even worldwide, and that some structure was needed to allow for this growth. The Fellowship would need to deal with its relationships with the world around it, its finances, its day-to-day administrative operations, and its publication and policy decisions—all among a number of other matters that would inevitably develop. Based on these needs, a complex but now-proven highly successful service structure was developed for our Fellowship. There are at least two basic principles on which this service structure was founded: that the ownership of AA would be its members and groups; and that its structure would always be democratic in thought, spirit and action.

Two entities were created, chartered and incorporated in the mid-1950s as not-forprofit organizations under the legal structure of the State of New York. These are known as Alcoholics Anonymous World Services, Inc., (AAWS) and the AA Grapevine, Inc. Each of these has its own board of directors. Additionally, some way to relate AA to the outside world and to coordinate AA policy and services was needed. For this purpose, AA's General Service Board (GSB) was created. Members of the GSB are referred to as Trustees, and include both alcoholic members and non-alcoholic AA supporters selected primarily for professional expertise they offer. Also needed was a way to deal with day-to-day operations. The AA General Service Office (GSO) with a paid staff was set up to do this. And finally, some method was needed to carry out the practical matters of AA ownership and democratic participation among its groups and members. To do this, the General Service Conference was set up, along with its participating structure of group representatives (GSRs), Districts with District Committees (DCMs), Areas and Area Officers, and Delegates elected from among these to represent them at an annual Conference meeting held in the Spring of each year. Communication and participation in decision making are primary functions of this Conference structure.

Early AA members also foresaw the need for services at the local level and, thus, intergroups and central offices were created to provide these services.

Bill saw each of these as working in service rather than as governing bodies. All would work together in the spirit of cooperation and service to the Fellowship as a whole as well as to AA groups and members.

Overall, this is a rather complex service structure, and Bill saw a need to provide further elaboration of the underlying principles and the foundation for how these entities would work together. The Twelve Concepts provide this. They were written in the early 1960s by Bill with the help of Bernard Smith, a Trustee at the time and Michael Alexander who later also became a Trustee. They were first published in 1962 as AA's Twelve Concepts for World Service.

Concept I - Responsibility and Authority for A.A. World Services Resides in the Collective Conscience of A.A. as a Whole.

I knew early on that there was something more to AA than my home group, and saw that I wanted to be a part of that. I was fortunate to meet a special AA member who introduced me to the study of the Twelve Traditions which further broadened my view of AA. This person became my Service Sponsor, and we sat down together to also study AA's Twelve Concepts. I had been aware of the Concepts, but I had no idea about what they were or why we had them.

Concept One introduces AA World Services, something I didn't even know existed. I suspected that the important AA business was taken care of by the big shots like Bill and Dr. Bob as well as the professional folks in the office in New York who sent us orders telling our group what to do and how to do it. My thinking was not completely wrong. For the first several years, responsibility and authority for all of AA did rest on the shoulders of our founders. By 1950, however, it became apparent that services such as producing uniform literature, developing public information resources, publishing books, and answering calls for help could no longer be handled by the founders alone. A serious decline in Dr. Bob's health was a major factor leading to this realization. Also, AA had expanded geographically and had grown in membership by large numbers.

Many early members felt that AA's future was guaranteed under the protection of God. But, after much discussion, there came a realization that a practical operational structure was needed. The first step was to create a group of AA members who, along with and non-alcoholic professionals, would take on responsibility for an orderly AA growth. This group, known early as the trusteeship, has now become the AA General Service Board.

Bill also saw that only a representative conference would be appropriate as a replacement for himself and Dr. Bob. The way to protect AA's future was to be found in the "collective conscience" of the Fellowship as a whole. Bill acknowledges that it is difficult to imagine how such a collective responsibility might be achieved among such widely scattered AA groups. His solution is in what we now know as the AA General Service Conference. Delegates to this Conference represent geographic Areas of the U.S. and Canada, elected by the individual groups through their elected General Service Representatives, District Committee members and other trusted servants.

The Conference operates in service to groups and members rather than as a governing body. Concept One draws heavily on Tradition Two for its spiritual foundation, reminding us that God is our ultimate authority and that AA leaders serve rather than govern. In this way, Concept One along with Tradition Two provides the spiritual foundation for all of our Fellowship. Bill has described AA as a spiritualized society characterized by enough enlightenment, enough responsibility, and enough love to ensure that it will work under all conditions. Concepts Two through Twelve follow to develop more detail about how our AA service structure works.

The Mommy Track

The fast path to being the drunk she swore she'd never be

Like any kid, I dreamed of what I'd be when I grew up. At times I'd think of being a cowgirl or maybe a superwoman. As I got older, my ideas turned more to dude rancher and horse farmer. Next, I seriously considered being a nun and living a life of service to Jesus. When I got married at age seventeen, I knew I'd really found my calling. I promised myself I'd be the best wife, homemaker, and mother in the world.

The one thing I swore I'd never be was an alcoholic, a drunk like my mother. I still held onto the pain and anger of her drinking. How could I ever forget the terror of the bus trip my sister and I were forced to take when she took us away from my father so she could remarry her first husband and have us meet our half-sister?

In California, I entered a world strange and completely different from the Southern town of the 1950s where I'd spent my life, a world where I had to join a gang in order to survive getting to and from school. Our stepfather, in his drunkenness, would try to molest my little sister and me. My mother lived to drink and dance and party, seemingly oblivious to our pain and fear. I became filled with resentment and hate.

Over the twelve years of my marriage, I kept that promise to myself, I thought. I drank on special occasions like holidays and birthdays, and usually got drunk when I did. I had no idea this was a problem. In fact, it seemed to me my drunken antics were a source of fun and hilarity for everyone, including me.

I could not understand why I felt constantly irritable, restless, and discontented. My husband and I had great jobs, a nice house decorated just the way we wanted, and a sweet little boy who was doing well in school. Still, I continually insisted we change something in our lives: rearrange the furniture, paint the house, even move or change jobs--anything to keep me busy and fill the hole inside me.

I had periodic fits of anger and depression that frightened my husband and child. I could not explain to them or to myself why I cried uncontrollably for an hour or more, or why I didn't get out of bed for a whole weekend. On the other hand, there were times when my energy knew no bounds and I appeared happy and contented. I knew something was terribly wrong, but because I had no idea what it was, I ended up blaming my husband and the responsibilities of being a wife and mother. It's hard to believe, looking back, that I made decisions and took actions that looked suspiciously like my mother's.

One day, I announced to my husband that I wanted a divorce. I did not love him anymore and I was leaving him and our son. I hardened my heart to his pleas and my little boy's desperate crying. With my sick will, I walked, out on both of them.

The next eleven years were filled with career and financial successes, and with increased drinking and partying. God had no place in my life for a long time. My guilt and self-centered attitude led me to believe that God was nothing more than the creator of nature and had absolutely nothing to do with me. I focused completely on work and running in the fast lane.

My son and I came to some terms with our situation. By the time he was fourteen, he, too, started drinking, using drugs, and getting into minor scrapes. He lived with me for a few months, but I sent him back to his father when he got to be too much to handle. Once again, I abdicated my role as his mother.

The next several years were a blur of drinking bouts, remorse, and despair, although I usually managed to maintain the outside appearance of normality. Deep inside, I knew things were slipping. In drunken cries to God, I demanded he tell me what was wrong with me. I felt insane and hopeless. More and more, I saw myself as my mother, the woman I'd hated for so long.

After one drinking spree, I came back to consciousness sicker than ever. It was July 1, 1984. Sitting on the side of my bed, feeling a loneliness that was indescribable, I put my head in my hands and sincerely cried out, "God, please help me!"

Oh, so quietly, the name of a casual friend came to my befuddled mind. He had been in a Twelve Step recovery program for a number of years, and although he was no longer one of my crowd, I did not question, "Why this man?" I picked up the phone and experienced the miracle of remembering his number. In hindsight, I have no doubt God was answering my prayer.

With this man's direction, I started going to AA meetings and began a journey of physical, mental, and spiritual recovery. Even though I was grateful arid relieved to discover what was wrong with me--that I was an alcoholic sick in body, mind, and spirit--I still had great fear and anger at the thought of never having another drink.

The years since that July morning have been both painful and glorious. Looking at myself and accepting my powerlessness over everything and everyone in my life opened the door to total acceptance of the power of God. I am now a regular human being with some inherent sins and faults, but with a spiritual solution that solves all my problems. I know I will never be able to drink with impunity but--miracle of miracles--I don't want to. And I will never have to, as long as I keep close to God and try to practice his principles.

Along with my freedom from the obsession to drink, a great many other special gifts have come into my life. I have a wonderful husband, also in recovery, and a strong and healthy relationship with my son, who is my best friend. It's amazing that today he is proud to have his two adorable daughters call me "Grandma." My husband and I pray together on a regular basis and were both baptized at the same time in our local church with family and many friends there to support us. I have a job that allows me to be of service and to actually use my past to help others.

And my mother? God works in such wondrous ways. After thirty long years of not speaking with or seeing my mother, my heart was opened to the idea of reaching out to her. My sister, Susan, gave me her address and I sent a short note asking my mother if she'd like to be in contact with me after all this time. Her return letter was immediate, warm, and welcoming. At the end of it she wrote, "Peggy, I hope you know that what I did was never meant to harm you." God bless her! Of course I knew. After all, I grew up just like her.



The Luckiest Mom



One of the promises in the Big Book talks about not regretting the past, nor shutting the door on it. My past was filled with shame, degradation, and terrible losses because of my alcoholism. But when a loving sponsor guided me through the

Steps, I experienced both divine and human forgiveness.

The greatest pain that resulted from my alcoholism came from losing my baby daughter. I made a decision to give her up for adoption before she was born. In 1971, my drinking was out of control prior to my pregnancy. The only reason I didn't drink while pregnant was because alcohol made me sick.

I went through the nine months dry and filled with self-hatred, shame, depression, and terrible guilt. I used an adoption agency that, in those days, offered no counseling to me. Every day I woke up with a sense of total uncertainty. I did not feel capable of raising a child by myself, and deep down I didn't feel as though I deserved a child because I was so very bad. When she was born, I held her briefly before she left for her new world. A piece of my soul died when they took her away.

For the next eight years, I tried to drink myself to death, tried to block out the misery and pain I felt. Although I was always unsuccessful at suicide, alcoholism is a very slow suicide. I was unable to maintain relationships, jobs, dreams, plans, and eventually, unable to maintain anything.

My disease progressed quickly and I became totally immersed in a vodka bottle. My family offered me money to get rid of me. I was arrested; my friends sat on bar stools in dark, seedy places; and I whirled through the lives of many innocent people, leaving wreckage wherever I went.

I became hopeless. I thought about my daughter whenever I saw a child. I worried about her safety and wallowed in self-pity over my decision to give her up. I was a drunken martyr and not a pretty sight. It seemed that I had lost everything important.

It is only by God's grace that I am sober today and I am grateful to be a member of Alcoholics Anonymous. In AA, I found the opportunity to face the truth in every area of my life.

When I came into the program, I knew in my heart that I was finally home. I felt safe for the first time in my life. I desperately wanted to stay sober and was willing to do whatever I was told. However, being an egomaniac with no self-worth, I balked at doing an inventory.

Finally, the day came. I was either going to drink, or I was going to write a Fourth Step and share it with my sponsor.

My biggest secret was the loss of my daughter. I finally got everything out, but the wound took years to heal. I thought I had forgiven myself many times, but the shame and guilt seemed to linger. I felt an empty place in my heart that nothing could fill. Today, I realize that God fills the holes in my heart if only I seek him. My biggest problem was resolving the conflict within myself. I could not understand how anyone, including me, would give up a child. My husband and I never had children because I did not think deserved to have another baby. My selfishness was costly to a lot of people.

One night I was sitting in a meeting on the Eighth Step, when someone said they continued to add to their amends list over time in an attempt to become more honest in their recovery. I immediately thought of my daughter and

how I had not known how to make amends, since I had no idea where she was.

The action I took was to call the adoption agency and ask to place information about myself on file. I did not want to search for her, but I wanted her to be able to know who I was if she ever decided to look for me. They sent me a legal form to complete that I held for several years. My fear that she would hate me was very great for a long time.

In 1992, I filled out the form, wrote a letter to my daughter about myself, and enclosed some photographs. I got on my knees and asked God only for his will to be done. I felt a sense of freedom because this was my attempt at amends. I went on with my life and recovery. On her birthday, I usually wrote to my precious child in my journal. I knew that God was totally in charge of the outcome. Each time I talked about my daughter I felt a bit lighter. I remember leading an Eighth Step meeting and talking about the loss. Several other people in the meeting shared about losing their children because of alcoholism. I was not alone anymore.

In 1994, I received a telephone call from the adoption agency.

"Pat, this is a wonderful day," the woman said. "Your daughter wants to talk with you, and she wants to meet you."

We set up a call time for that very night; I cried for the rest of the day. My AA sponsor and my sponsor from another program came to my apartment to support me. I prayed for guidance and strength.

The phone rang and I heard her voice, which sounded a lot like my own. I answered her questions and began a relationship that is absolutely awesome. She sent pictures of herself, and our resemblance is remarkable. I flew to the city where she lives to meet her.

I spent that weekend in the middle of Step Nine. I did not excuse my behavior, I did not blame my alcoholism, and I knew that I had to be very honest with her. We talked for hours and hours and we both cried a lot. She is a beautiful woman with a forgiving heart and soul. Her family had always told her she was a gift, and that I loved her very much.

My perception of her feelings was completely wrong. She had never felt anything except love and curiosity about me. Her adoptive mother and I have a wonderful relationship and have spent time together. She did a beautiful job raising my daughter, and I owe her a huge debt of gratitude. Everyone in my daughter's family has welcomed me with unconditional love.

Since our first meeting was about getting the truth out, our relationship has not been mired with excess baggage. We have a very special bond as friends who respect, honor, and love the women we have become. I attended her college graduation and her wedding. We talk on the phone often, and she really enjoys coming to visit me.

She has often commented about the quality of my relationship with women in AA. Ironically, she came into my life at a time when I have less materially in recovery than I have ever had. I know that God wants me to just be me, without any trimmings. I have been available to her on a deep emotional level, and have not tried to control one aspect of this relationship, which is a miracle. In my heart of hearts, I understand that this is another precious gift from God, and that is how I treat her. The hole in my heart is filled and overflows with love today.

None of this would have been possible without the other gift in my life: sobriety and the program of Alcoholics Anonymous. I feel divine forgiveness and sometimes believe I'm the luckiest mom in the world. Recently, I got a card from her that said: "I am so lucky because I have two wonderful mothers."
